

Some examples of Collaboration in Training:

- the Documentary Network of Indigenous Peoples, the Documentation Centre for Indigenous Peoples (DoCIP) and indigenous peoples' groups co-organised four courses for indigenous peoples, in English, French, Spanish and Russian
- HURIDOCS and Ain o Salish Kendra collaborate in organizing needs assessment, strategy session for management and trainings on fact-finding, monitoring and documentation of violations for human rights groups in Bangladesh
- The United Nations Mission in Iraq and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights co-organised a training course on library documentation for fifteen librarians from Iraq
- the Netherlands Helsinki Committee and local human rights organisations co-organised training courses and training for trainers on monitoring and documentation of violations in Turkey
